Reviving the Past: The Simulation Technology Trifecta of ChatGPT, Voice Cloning, and Virtual Reality to Promote Empathy and Understanding of Our Shared History



Relevant Theory & Research

Research is ongoing, and the project draws on various areas of discovery, including artificial intelligence, educational technology, and history or subject matter education. The ChatGPT large language model (LLM) forms the backbone of the project. In addition, the incorporation of text-to-audio with voice cloning technology and virtual reality technology allows for a dynamic and immersive learning experience that aligns with theories on experiential learning and enhanced empathy through simulation. Furthermore, theories on effective instruction, such as the ADDIE model of instructional design, will be applied to ensure that the simulation technology trifecta is thoroughly planned, developed, and evaluated to achieve the desired outcomes. The project is guided by the premise that through innovative educational technologies, learners can develop a deeper understanding and empathy toward historical events, figures, and contexts.

The following initial research begins to identify the technology components of the proposed simulation technology trifecta that utilizes the ChatGPT, text-to-audio with voice cloning technology, and virtual reality technologies to create human-like simulations that enable learners to interact with historical figures. Additional research on educational technology and instructional design will be conducted and outlined within future iterations of this project.

Generative Artificial Intelligence

ChatGPT, a generative pre-trained transformer, has become a hot topic since its introduction in November 2022 due to its potential to revolutionize many aspects of learning (Hao, 2023). Developed by Sam Altman at OpenAI, ChatGPT is a chatbot and natural language processor that mimics common grammar and language structure, allowing for human-like interaction (Lock, 2022). The technology utilizes pre-trained data from 2021 and earlier to generate responses to user input (Lock, 2022).

An important component for utilizing ChatGPT in simulation development is prompt-based learning, a process noted by Liu et. al (2023) that involves providing guidelines and structure to an AI such as ChatGPT to maximize its expected output. In this project, a persona pattern has been utilized to instruct the ChatGPT chatbot to embody the persona of President Abraham Lincoln, providing learners with an immersive and authentic experience (Wong, 2023). "The Persona pattern gives the LLM a persona or role to play when generating output" (White et. al, 2023, p. 4). Appendix A outlines a persona based ChatGPT conversation with the AI playing the role of former President, Abraham Lincoln. Questions sourced for this conversation were gathered from a Quora.com question-and-answer platform posted by Dudkin (2016) where individuals shared questions answering the forum prompt of "If Abraham Lincoln were alive, what would you ask him?"

Overall, ChatGPT has the potential to significantly enhance simulation technology by providing a dynamic and interactive learning experience that allows learners to engage with historical figures in a more personal and meaningful way.

Text-to-Audio with Voice Cloning

Another critical component in resurrecting historical figures for educational purposes is to incorporate a lifelike voice. With the inclusion of a text-to-speech element in this technology trifecta, we aim to leverage Neural Voice Cloning technology. According to Arik et al (2018), this innovative technology enables the synthesis of a person's voice from only a few audio samples. An exciting development in this field is VALL-E, a project supported by Microsoft that simulates anyone's voice with only three seconds of audio (Edwards, 2023). In our use-case scenario, we will bring President Abraham Lincoln's voice back to life utilizing voice snippets gathered from a popular Lincoln impersonator.

The integration of Neural Voice Cloning technology into this simulation technology trifecta adds a new dimension of realism and authenticity, enabling learners to engage with historical figures in a more immersive and engaging way. By combining cutting-edge technologies such as VALL-E with historical research and commonly accepted voice audio, we can create a dynamic and interactive educational experience that brings history to life.

Virtual Reality

To complete this simulation technology trifecta, virtual reality will be incorporated. The term "virtual reality" was first coined by Ivan Sutherland, an engineering faculty member at Harvard, in 1968 (Brock, 2023). Brock (2023) noted that Sutherland's work aimed to create 3D scenes, and he developed a head-mounted display to facilitate the viewing of these scenes. In recent years, research has shown the potential of virtual reality in enhancing student learning outcomes and increasing user empathy (Shin, 2018). Fabris conducted research in 2019 that highlighted the benefits of virtual reality in promoting learning, while Shin's study in 2018 demonstrated the potential of VR stories to enhance empathy among users.

By incorporating virtual reality technology into this project, we aim to provide an immersive and engaging learning experience that enables learners to interact with historical figures in a simulated environment. The use of virtual reality will allow learners to explore historical settings and events in a more experiential way, enhancing their understanding and emotional connection to historical events. Furthermore, incorporating virtual reality into this simulation technology trifecta will enable learners to visualize and understand historical contexts that are difficult to convey through traditional teaching methods.

Goals & Objectives

The main goals and objectives of the project are to develop a highly sophisticated simulation that integrates a balanced technology trifecta of ChatGPT, text-to-audio with voice cloning technology, and virtual reality technologies to create human-like simulations of historical figures. This highly immersive and interactive experience allows learners to engage in a conversation with historical figures such as Abraham Lincoln, gaining a deeper understanding of historical events and the context in which they took place. The project aims to foster empathy and emotional connection with historical events by enabling learners to gain firsthand insight into the challenges faced by historical figures and the sacrifices they made to overcome them.

Rationale

The rationale for the project is to leverage cutting-edge educational technologies to create a dynamic and interactive educational experience that fosters empathy, emotional connection, and a deeper understanding of our shared history. The project has the potential to revolutionize the way learners engage with historical events by creating a highly sophisticated simulation technology trifecta that integrates ChatGPT, text-to-audio with voice cloning technologies, and

virtual reality technologies. The project is motivated by the need to provide learners with a dynamic and interactive educational experience that goes beyond traditional classroom learning. By leveraging the simulation technology trifecta, learners are presented with a highly immersive experience that simulates a conversation with a historical figure, offering a unique opportunity to gain firsthand insight into their lives and experiences.

Implementation Plan

More research should be conducted to properly outline the appropriate implementation plan. Initial components of the project implementation will include identifying historical figures that best align with the simulation design; developing the persona pattern within ChatGPT to fine-tune the pre-trained data to assist the technology in accurately simulating the selected historical figures' personalities, tone, and language; integrate the neural voice cloning technology to synthesize the ideal replication of the chosen historical figure's voice; develop a virtual reality environment and avatar of the historical figure that accurately depicts the historical settings and events; and identify the desired learning objectives of the project's educational content.

A more detailed implementation plan will include details about the deployment of the historical figure simulation within educational institutions, museums, and other learning environments. Additionally, details about training sessions for teachers and other facilitators will be conducted to ensure they understand the simulation and how it can effectively be used in their teaching.

Evaluation Plan

The evaluation plan will include a thorough evaluation of the simulation and its effectiveness in achieving the desired learning outcomes. The impact of the simulation will be

measured based on the learner's level of engagement, understanding, and empathy with regard to the outlined historical event. Both qualitative and quantitative data will be gathered to evaluate the success of the simulation technology as it relates to learning outcomes, engagement, and empathy.

Overall, the evaluation plan for the project will aim to assess the effectiveness of the simulation and deployment of the technology trifecta in achieving the desired outcomes of the project, including fostering empathy and emotional connection towards historical events and figures. The plan involves user testing, measuring learning outcomes, assessing empathy and emotional connection, collecting data, analyzing results, and refining and improving the simulation technology trifecta based on the feedback received. The evaluation plan is crucial for ensuring that the project achieves its goals and objectives and provides an engaging and effective learning experience for learners.
